Celebrating the Year of the Eucharist

In accordance with the wishes of Bishop Weigand and recent discussions in our Liturgy Council and Pastoral Council, Holy Family Parish is working to foster a renewed understanding of the celebration of the Mass and to bring about a deeper understanding of the Eucharist. To this end, I have made the following recommendations to the councils:

- *At some point during the year, over the course of three or four weekends, we will give catechesis during the homily on the parts and prayers of the Mass, clarifying the inner, divine action of the Mass.*
- *We will continue to provide brief, written catechesis on the various parts of the Mass.*
- *Throughout the year we will continue to educate the faithful on how to "be in church" - what they should do when entering the church; genuflection to the Blessed Sacrament; atmosphere of reverence and recollection; indications for how to participate internally in the Mass, uniting one's mind and heart with the action of Christ; how to participate externally, responding or interpreting the common parts; and, suggestions for how to get the most out of certain moments - times of silence, personal prayer after communion.*

To promote Eucharistic worship and personal and community prayer in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, we will attempt some of the following:

- *Continue to provide opportunities for prayer and adoration before the exposed Eucharist and for Benediction.*
- *Pray one weekday each month in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament and have a special vocation prayer of reflection at weekend Masses for vocations to the priesthood and religious life.*
- *After the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, we will re-emphasize the time of Eucharistic adoration.*

As Holy Family Parish ventures deeply into the Year of the Eucharist, we reflect on the words of Pope John Paul II, "May the Year of the Eucharist be for everyone a precious opportunity to grow in awareness of the incomparable treasure which Christ has entrusted to his Church. May it encourage a more lively and fervent celebration of the Eucharist, leading to a Christian life transformed by love."

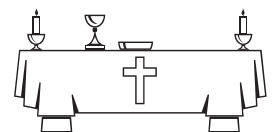

HOLY FAMILY LITURGY COUNCIL

MORE FROM THE FEBRUARY LITURGY COUNCIL MEETING:

The Holy Family Liturgy Council is an advisory board which assists Fr. Kiernan and Fr. Raudes in the preparation, execution and evaluation of liturgical services held in the parish throughout the year.

At the February meeting, the Council put plans into motion for Lent 2005, from Ash Wednesday through the Fifth Sunday of Lent. In addition to Sunday and daily Masses, the Council addressed such liturgical activities as Stations of the Cross, First Reconciliation, Holy Hour, RCIA rites and a Lenten Communal Penance Service.

A Holy Hour has been planned for Tuesday, March 8, 2005, at 7:00 pm in the church, which will be an integral part of at least three ongoing liturgical functions. The Holy Hour will further Holy Family's commitment to the Year of the Eucharist; it will be a key element of the prayer aspect of the season of Lent; and, it will serve as an occasion to bring the whole parish family together to fulfill its role in the preparation of those who will receive the Rites of Christian Initiation at Easter, through the live presentation of the Creed. Holy Family has offered four Holy Hour celebrations over the last 13 months, and the presence of Christ has poured its blessings on those who have participated in so many ways. The Liturgy Council invites you to share in the experience.

The Lenten Communal Penance or Reconciliation Service will be Wednesday, March 16, 2005, at 7:00 pm, and will follow a format similar to our very successful Advent program. Penance is a central element of the season of Lent, and celebrating in union with your parish family is an excellent way to experience God's inexhaustible mercy. As each of these events draws nearer, full details will be made available in the bulletin.

The next Liturgy Council meeting will be Thursday, March 3, at 7:00 pm in St. Joseph Hall of the Community Center. (This is a variance from the date announced at the February meeting and our customary first-Wednesday meeting schedule, so please make a note of it.) At the March meeting, the Council will finalize details on the remaining weeks of Lent, including Palm Sunday, and plan the liturgies that comprise the heart of the liturgical year - the Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil) - as well as Easter Sunday and the beginning of the Easter season.

In his fantasy epic of The Lord of the Rings, JRR Tolkien powerfully proclaims, narrates and celebrates human redemption in our time. Professor Tolkien deals with the human experience of fall and tragedy, the persistence and power of evil, the use and abuse of power, the destructive effect of loss and longing, and the continuing conflict of virtue with vice. Then with subtlety and sensitivity, Tolkien brings the wisdom and tradition of Roman Catholicism to encompass the human experience with the presence of God's love.

(This presentation is approved for two Catechist Hours in Personal Spirituality.)

The Season of Lent

Lent is a season focused on the renewal of our baptism. We share the special Gospels of the season and take them to heart to experience the dying and rising and redemption that are the Paschal Mystery.

Lent is a season of penitential reflection during which we are inspired to practice a more Christian life. Lent shows us the example of Christ, and by fasting and penance, it enables us to share in His sufferings - something we must do to be able to share in His Redemption. Fasting is a part of the nature of the season, and like all the penitential practices of Lent, fasting and abstinence are offered to God in union with the sacrifice of the Cross. Purple vestments are worn to remind us of the penance of Lent.

Always remember that we are not alone during this season. We belong to an immense body in which we are united with all of humankind looking forward to redemption by Christ. We are not passive - we reach actively for His saving grace, so it is quite fitting that this Lent begins with the Annual Catholic Appeal where we focus our attention on serving those ravaged by poverty.

Lent is also a season for spiritual development. It is shared with the entire Church preparing to celebrate the Paschal mystery. It is a time for continuing formation of children and adults alike. Holy Family continues the efforts of Catholic Faith Formation for our children, particularly preparing for the celebration of Sacraments, while Bible Classes, RCIA and other special programs offer formation for the adults of the parish.

The spirit of Lent is built on the three traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and abstinence, and almsgiving.

Prayer

Prayer can take many forms, and Lent presents opportunities for several of these forms of prayer. One of the best forms of prayer is the slow and thoughtful reading of Sacred Scripture. In the Sacred Scriptures, God unfolds the history of salvation through the prophets of old and through His Son, Jesus Christ, His gospels revealing the lessons that Jesus offered to lead us to salvation.



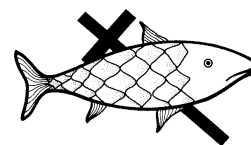
Focusing on Scripture can give us new insight into the ways in which God is speaking to us today. Study of the Catechism of the Catholic Church is also prayerful. While private prayer is crucial, prayer during lent should also take on a public form. Catholics should make every effort to increase our participation in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, the Stations of the Cross, Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, and, perhaps most importantly, Daily Mass. Lent 2005 is part of the Year of the Eucharist, so participating in daily Mass during Lent is the best prayer we can make.

Fast and Abstinence

Here's a quick review of the Lenten practices of fast and abstinence.

Abstinence: As it relates to the season of Lent, to abstain is to not eat meat. The purpose of this abstinence is to be an act of penance - an act of sacrifice. Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.

Fasting: To fast is to do without food. Quite simply, part of its purpose is the very experience of the effects of not eating - if you don't eat, you get hungry; when you get hungry, your body compensates with a heightened sense of awareness. So, by fasting, we clarify our thinking and our feeling, which prepares us to pray more deeply. Like abstinence, fasting also serves as penance or sacrifice. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.



Almsgiving

Almsgiving is helping others by sharing with them that which is ours. There are many ways to practice almsgiving - you can share love and compassion, or you can share your time and resources. The most recognized form of almsgiving is giving money to assist the poor, or to some worthy organization committed to helping the poor, the abandoned or neglected. Today's Annual Catholic Appeal is a perfect opportunity both for almsgiving and stewardship. Sharing our time can also be valuable - visiting and assisting the sick, the elderly and others who are homebound or in nursing homes or in our community. Keep in mind that all that we have to give belongs to God, and sharing it with others is a wonderful practice both during Lent and throughout the year.
