This week I would like to share with you a few thoughts on how we are challenged by the great celebration of the Eucharist. The center and summit of the entire celebration is the Eucharistic Prayer. Our church, our faith, our very lives as Christians are built on the sacred mystery of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ that we will mark in the week ahead, and this is the part of every Mass where we fulfill what Christ asked of us the night before he died, to “do this in remembrance” of His gift of salvation.

ARE WE READY FOR THIS PRAYER?

Yes, I will lift up my heart. And I will give God thanks and praise. I'll stay awake. I'll listen to every word. I'll sing every acclamation and Amen. Thus I will put energy into praying the Eucharistic prayer at Mass on Sunday. I'll bring to it every bit of life. I'll remember everything, especially the hard stuff (after all, at the center of this prayer is a body to be broken for us, a covenant made in the blood of Christ.)

I will be so attentive that when we've finished the Eucharistic prayer with a room-shaking Amen, I'll know just how right and good it is to pray the Our Father together, greet one another with Christ's peace, then enter a procession (not a line-up, a procession) that is singing its way to the table of the Lord.

And I'll come hungry. By some kind of fasting - from food, from entertainment, from distractions - I'll come on Sunday after Sunday knowing in body and soul how hungry I am to hear God's word, how hungry I am to give God thanks and praise and how hungry I am to feast on the body of Christ given for us, the blood of Christ poured out for us.

And I'll never again think that I can do any of this alone. How could I? It is not I who give God thanks and praise, it is the body of Christ that makes this Eucharistic prayer. All the baptized people in the room put their lives into this prayer that the ordained priest proclaims. And it goes beyond the room. That's why we remember the church all over the world in our prayers for the bishop and the pope, the living and dead.

Am I ready for this prayer? Are we?

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES SPECIAL COLLECTION:

Thank you for your generosity in supporting the second collection last weekend for Catholic Relief Services. As has been the case with other recent special collections, the generosity has continued beyond the collections at Mass, and we will report the final results when available.

THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE AND RECONCILIATION:

As you have been reminded in the last few weeks, Lent is a season of baptismal renewal and penitential reflection – a time to turn away from evil and walk in the way of the Lord. An integral part of this is the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Reconciliation is a part of all sacraments, particularly present in the sacraments of initiation, the focus of our Lenten preparation. Not only are we taking part in the preparation of the elect for their initiation at the Easter Vigil, but the Lenten path leads all of us to the sacrament of reconciliation, which frees us from the weight of sin, restores our baptismal gifts and reconciles us with God and the whole church.

We celebrated the Sacrament of Reconciliation communally last week, not for expediency or convenience, but because it is truly a community event. Pope John Paul II wrote, "there is no sin, not even the most intimate and secret one, the most strictly individual one, that exclusively concerns the person committing it. With greater or lesser violence, with greater or lesser harm, every sin has repercussions on the entire ecclesial body and the whole human family."

Thus, as sin affects the whole community, so does reconciliation have an effect on the whole community. Healing is present in the community of the church, and all are welcome - individuals need to be aware that they are welcome into the life of the church and the church needs to be welcomed into the life of the individual. We all need Christ's loving forgiveness, and we need each other to know that his forgiveness is real.

- a journey of discipleship: Jesus, the one Teacher, has said: "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me" (Mt 16: 24).
- a priestly and royal journey: Jesus, consecrated by the Spirit, is King and Priest; the meek and innocent Lamb offers himself, as a victim for the sin of the world.
- a journey of hope: As he walks to his death, Jesus knows that he is hastening towards the resurrection.
- a journey of fullness: The Way of the Cross is full of pain and unbounded love, of total abasement and sublime exaltation, of immense compassion and anxious expectation.

Join us on Good Friday evening for a special presentation of the journey as Holy Family offers the annual Outdoor Stations of the Cross. The path of Christ's Passion and Death is marked by members of the community and accompanied by music and prayer. This program is a wonderful, spirit-filled celebration that has become a popular annual tradition for our parish - a definite "must experience" event. The Outdoor Stations are celebrated behind the school and begin at 7:30 p.m. on Good Friday, March 25th.

"MANGIAMO ITALIANO!" – "LET'S EAT ITALIAN!"

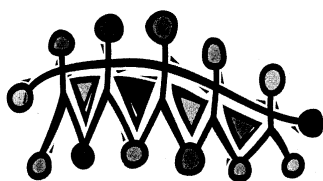

THE TRIDUUM – ONE GREAT CELEBRATION

We leave the church on this Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion with blessed palms in hand and the Passion of Christ in our hearts to begin the journey of Holy Week. We live in anxious anticipation of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and the Easter Vigil, and we look forward to the "Feast of Feasts" that is Easter Sunday, when Christ crushed death!

In this time of both solemn and joyful celebration, we journey on the road from betrayal and death to glorious resurrection with the One who walked that way first - for us. Christ's entire ministry culminated in his willingness to die for us that we may claim his inheritance - God's all-encompassing love and mercy for all, even sinners, the sick, the poor, and the abandoned.

The season of Lent comes to an end on the morning of Holy Thursday, and we begin the celebration of the Triduum. These three days are one great celebration from the evening of Holy Thursday through Easter Sunday.

These three days are the most important days of celebration in the Catholic Church. The entire liturgical year leads up to the Triduum. During these three days, we follow Christ through His betrayal, death and resurrection. These sacred days are so central to our faith that every effort should be made to set aside our ordinary routines as much as possible to take part in each of the liturgies of the triduum - to live the celebration of the Triduum.

Holy Thursday

The Holy Thursday mass celebrates the many facets of Jesus' last supper - the institution of the priesthood, the institution of the mass and the first Eucharist. Jesus instructs his disciples, as they too share in the Eucharist, that the path to salvation is paved by service - to wash each others' feet. Jesus provides a living example of how we are to be Eucharist for one another - by serving. We celebrate and thank God for the life-giving gift of the bread and wine that become, the body and blood - the true presence - of Jesus.

Good Friday

Everything that Jesus did was an act of love to the ones to whom God had sent him (all of us.) His execution - a scandal and a failure on the surface - as in all good parables was transformed to glory by his rising from the dead. Not failure, but

victory; not scandal, but a cause for ultimate rejoicing. God so loved us, that He sent His only begotten Son to die for us, so that our sins may be forgiven. It is in his dying that so many people find hope - women and children who have been abused, people who are oppressed, tortured, dying. And we believe that his dying was not the end, but the beginning. It is because of Jesus' death that Christians have hope. It is because of Jesus' death that human suffering - illness, madness, natural disaster, violence - is given some meaning. His death gives our suffering meaning and the potential for liberation and salvation.

Holy Saturday

Holy Saturday is a day when all creation waits, a quiet day, the day when "The Word of God through whom all had been made lay buried in the darkness of the earth." Creation waits for the Word to break forth again to make all things new. We need to remember this day, this peaceful day, this quiet day, when Jesus lay in the tomb, when the Word was silent and all of God's creation waited with hushed expectation for all things to be made new.

Easter Vigil

After sunset on Holy Saturday evening, the Church gathers in darkness to light a fire, the Easter Fire. From that fire, we light the Christ candle, the Light that has no end. We gather in darkness to hear old stories of God's mercy and to remember that God became human like us in all things but sin, walked in our shoes and died for our salvation. We listen in darkness, and then, in a burst of glorious celebration, in a bath of light, we sing Gloria! Alleluia! YES! He lives! YES! He is with us still! And on this night, this holiest of nights, we baptize and accept into the Church those who wish to become one with us at the Table of the Lord. We rejoice in the promise fulfilled, in the hope that has become reality.

Easter Sunday

"Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen" (Luke 24:5-6). This is how the angel of the Lord encourages the women who have come to Christ's tomb on Easter morning. The Easter Mass repeats this message anew to all of us: Christ is risen, Christ is alive among us! His name now is "the Living One," death has no more power over him (Romans 6:9).

Daily Prayers for the Triduum

Beginning the Triduum

Jesus, Lord and Savior, as we remember your passion, death and resurrection these three holy days, keep our minds and hearts centered on you and the gift of life that you gave us through your death. Grant that the weeks of Lent have not been in vain, for we have once again turned away from sin so as to follow more faithfully in your footsteps.

Holy Thursday

Lord Jesus, Redeemer and Savior, on this night, this holy night, you were arrested and brought to trial. On this night, you showed us how to love one another - by serving one another, washing each other's feet. We, your people, ask you to Sanctify your people, redeemed by your blood. Hear our prayer this holy night, and grant us a share in the glory of your resurrection.

Good Friday

The Son of God, the God of life, he offered his life freely. And now all who follow in his way, walk the road to eternal life. In the days of his earthly life he prayed, he healed, he forgave, he loved, and now all who follow in his way, walk the road to eternal life.

Holy Saturday

God of life and love, your Son Jesus lived with us on this earth, teaching, healing, feeding and comforting. He died on a cross, an instrument of torture. Gracious God, you raised him from the dead and gave him a place at your right hand. Grant to us who have died and been raised through the waters of baptism, a life with him in your presence forever, in the kingdom which knows no end.

Easter

This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad, alleluia! We praise you, God of Life, for you have always fulfilled your promises to your people! The lost have been found, the hungry have been fed, prisoners set free, the dead raised to life.
