### "I WILL MAKE ALL THINGS NEW"

As we celebrate the joyful 50 day Easter Season, I hope you find the following thoughts helpful in this glorious time.

The Resurrection of Jesus is not just something we believe; it is the reason we believe anything at all. Paul said it clearly: If Christ has not risen, our faith is in vain and we are still trapped in

our sins, the most pitiable of people (1 Cor 15:17). We believe in the Risen Christ because a large and diverse group of credible witnesses testified that they had seen him alive again, days after his death and burial. Paul listed some of them: Peter, the Twelve, 500 disciples at once, James and "last of all, as one born abnormally, he appeared to me" (1 Cor 15:34).

*The Resurrection of Jesus is not just something we believe; it is the reason we believe anything at all.*

These men and women spread the news of the Resurrection through the Middle East, then on to Greece and Rome. They had nothing to gain by telling their story and everything to lose. Peter died on the cross, Paul by the sword; hundreds of others joined them.

The Resurrection of Jesus was a wholly unprecedented event. Jesus had raised Lazarus from his grave and summoned the daughter of Jairus back to life, but Lazarus died again and so did the little girl of Galilee. When Jesus rose, however, he drained death of most of its power. It can still claim us, but it cannot hold us. We too shall live again and forever as God's children, sharing the joyous unending of the Father, Son and Spirit.

Death has always been the most intractable enemy of our race. Our society pours billions into technology hoping to keep it at bay. In a frenzied search to prolong human life, we even speak of cloning and destroying human embryos. All this technology may postpone death for a few years or even decades, but all of us who are now living will die. Easter brings us the good news that Eternal Life has replaced death as the horizon of our lives.

Our resurrection faith does not turn us away from the world, but plunges us into it. Scripture tells us that all creation will share this new and eternal life. The Bible ends, as it began, with the act of creation: "I will make all things new," says the Lord, "a new heaven and a new earth" (Rev. 21: 1,20). The earth shares in this resurrection promise. God commands us to tend it justly and use it wisely for the good of all those who are living now. We must also keep it safe for those countless generations yet unborn that will join us in God's Kingdom.

### **CHRISTIAN UNITY THROUGH PRAYER:**

This weekend, we welcome Reverend A. Dwight Burchett, President of the National Association of Evangelicals, Northern California. Reverend Burchett is a personal friend of Bishop Weigand who has previously invited him to preach in the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. We join the millions of Christians throughout the world in praying for unity among the Christian Churches as willed by Christ.

Pastor Burchett is well known in the community and has pastored Valley Community Church for 37 years. We welcome him and his dear wife Dorothy who is also well known as a counselor in the community for many years.

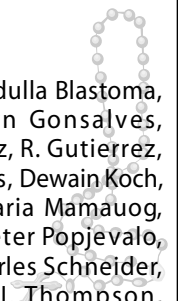
### **PARISH VOCATIONS COMMITTEE:**

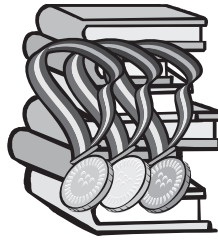

## HOLY FAMILY LITURGY COUNCIL

The Holy Family Liturgy Council met Wednesday evening, April 6th. Much of this month's meeting focused on a review of the numerous liturgical events of the last month. The Council discussed and evaluated the Holy Hour, Reconciliation Service, Palm Sunday, the special events of Holy Week, the Triduum (Holy Thursday through Easter) and the Masses offered for the Holy Father. Each month, the Council reviews all liturgical activity of the previous month to find areas that can be improved for future celebrations as well as areas of success. One common note on all events of March was an expression of gratitude for the large number of Holy Family parishioners that made all the celebrations possible with their gifts of time and talent.

In addition, the Council discussed upcoming events through the remainder of the Easter Season, including the Sacraments of First Communion and Confirmation. The Council seated subcommittees to make initial plans for Pentecost, Trinity Sunday and Corpus Christi to be presented at the May meeting.

The Council set a date for the next special celebration of the Year of the Eucharist - a Holy Hour scheduled for Wednesday, May 11, 2005, at 7:00 p.m. More information will be available as the date approaches.

A subcommittee was also appointed to begin planning for a Parish Picnic in early June. This family event will be offered in conjunction with a Liturgical Ministry Weekend.

The next meeting is Wednesday, May 4, 2005, at 7:00 pm in St. Joseph Hall of the Community Center.

THE HOLY FATHER  
JOHN PAUL II

*Excerpts from the homily by Cardinal Ratzinger, dean of the College of Cardinals, during the funeral Mass of Pope John Paul II.*

"Follow me." The Risen Lord says these words to Peter. They are his last words to this disciple, chosen to shepherd his flock. "Follow me" -- this lapidary saying of Christ can be taken as the key to understanding the message which comes to us from the life of our late beloved Pope John Paul II. Today we bury his remains in the earth as a seed of immortality -- our hearts are full of sadness, yet at the same time of joyful hope and profound gratitude.

Follow me! In October 1978, Cardinal Wojtyla ... heard the voice of the Lord. Once more there took place that dialogue with Peter



reported in the Gospel of this Mass: "Simon, son of John, do you love me? Feed my sheep!" To the Lord's question, 'Karol, do you love me?' the archbishop of Krakow answered from the depths of his heart: "Lord, you know everything: you know that I love you." The love of Christ was the dominant force in the life of our beloved Holy Father. Anyone who ever saw him pray, who ever heard him preach, knows that. Thanks to his being profoundly rooted in Christ, he was

able to bear a burden which transcends merely human abilities: that of being the shepherd of Christ's flock, his universal Church.

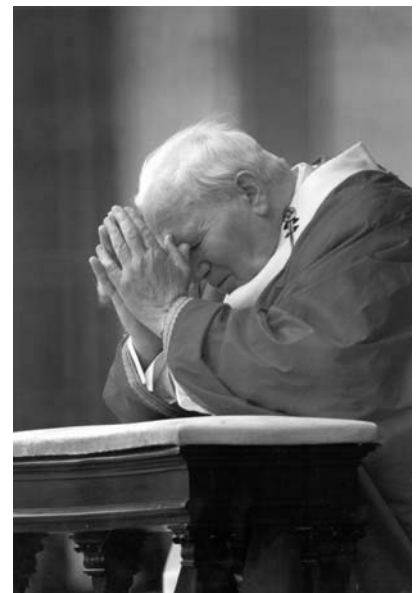
Follow me! Together with the command to feed his flock, Christ proclaimed to Peter that he would die a martyr's death. With those words, which conclude and sum up the dialogue on the love and on the mandate of the universal shepherd, the Lord recalls another dialogue, which took place during the Last Supper. There Jesus had said: "Where I am going, you cannot come." Peter said to him, "Lord, where are you going?" Jesus replied: "Where I am going, you cannot follow me now: but you will follow me afterward." (John 13:33-36). Jesus from the Supper went toward the Cross, went toward his resurrection -- he entered into the paschal mystery and Peter could not follow him. Now -- after the resurrection -- comes the time, comes this "afterward." By

shepherding the flock of Christ, Peter enters into the paschal mystery, he goes toward the cross and the resurrection. The Lord says this in these words: "...when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go;" (John 21:18) In the first years of his pontificate, still young and full of energy, the Holy Father went to the very ends of the earth, guided by Christ. But afterward, he increasingly entered into the communion of Christ's sufferings; increasingly he understood the truth of the words: "Someone else will fasten a belt around you." And in the very communion with the suffering Lord, tirelessly and with renewed intensity, he proclaimed the Gospel, the mystery of that love which goes to the end (John 13:1).

Divine Mercy: the Holy Father found the purest reflection of God's mercy in the Mother of God. He who at an early age had lost his own mother, loved his divine mother all the more. He heard the words of the crucified Lord as addressed personally to him: "Behold your Mother." And so he did as the beloved disciple did: "He took her into his own home." (John 19:27)

None of us can ever forget how in that last Easter Sunday of his life, the Holy Father, marked by suffering, came once more to the window of the Apostolic Palace and one last time gave his blessing *urbi et orbi*. We can be

sure that our beloved pope is standing today at the window of the Father's house, that he sees us and blesses us. Yes, bless us, Holy Father. We entrust your dear soul to the Mother of God, your Mother, who guided you each day and who will guide you now to the eternal glory of her Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.
