TRUTH UNCOVERED

Each day is a new gift from God who blesses us day by day. God's Spirit of Wisdom speaks to us in ways that often surprise us. God uncovers truths that we had kept hidden from ourselves and supports us in tasks we fear to undertake alone.

The Weight of Nothing

“Tell me the weight of a snowflake,” a wren asked a wild dove. “Nothing more than nothing,” was the answer. “In that case, I must tell you a marvelous story,” the wren said.

“I sat on a branch of a fir, close to its trunk, when it began to snow - not heavily, not in a raging blizzard - no, just like a dream, without any violence.”

“Since I didn't have anything better to do, I counted the snow flakes settling on the twigs and needles of my branch. Their number was exactly three million, seven-hundred forty-one thousand, nine hundred and fifty-two. When the next snowflake dropped on the branch - nothing more than nothing as you say - the branch broke off.”

Having said that, the wren flew away.

The dove, since Noah's time an authority on the matter, thought about the story for a while and finally said to herself, “Perhaps there is only one person's voice lacking for peace, justice and charity to come about in the world.”

May God continue to bless you in this Holy Season, and may you find His voice burning within you, filling your hearts with a love that is longing to be shared!

GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY /

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS:

Today is known as Good Shepherd Sunday because, in each year of the liturgical cycle on this 4th Sunday, the Gospel is always taken from the 10th chapter of John where Jesus speaks of himself as the “good shepherd”. In today's gospel we are depicted as sheep, and Jesus describes the love He has for us, His flock, by listing the 3 things that qualify Him to be called the good shepherd. First, He doesn't work for pay - the only compensation Jesus asks is to be loved in return. Second, the Good Shepherd knows His flock by name, each one of us is recognized and respected. Third, a good shepherd will lay down His life for His sheep... and Jesus did.

In addition, today we celebrate World Day of Prayer for Vocations. The theme for this year's celebration is “Called to Put Out into the Deep.” This is a good time to reflect on the vocation to follow Christ and in a special light to follow Him in service to the priesthood and consecrated life. We pray that the Church may be provided with the leaders needed to do its work of spreading the Gospel.

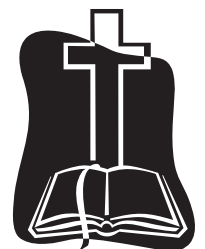

CONCLAVE

“PRO ELIGENDO ROMANO PONTIFICE”

Monday, April 18, 2005

Pope John Paul II's death set into motion an historic chain of events to elect a successor. Beginning tomorrow, Monday, April 18, 2005, cardinals will enter a solemnly secret conclave in the Sistine Chapel to elect the 262nd successor to the apostle Peter.

Pope Paul VI in 1970 set an upper limit of 120 to the number of cardinals participating in the conclave, all of whom must be under the age of 80. There were 117 eligible electors at last count, representing the broadest range of humanity in the church's history. The election rules were last changed by Pope John Paul II in 1996 with his Apostolic Constitution, or ruling, called *Universi Dominici Gregis* (All the Lord's Flock).

WHAT IS A CONCLAVE?

The word conclave comes from the Latin “with key.” Once the cardinals have entered the precinct, the great bronze door of the apostolic palace is shut to the cry of “*Extra Omnes*” - all out - and all the doors and windows are closed with lead seals. The cardinals take an oath of secrecy when they enter the conclave. They are forbidden all contact with the outside world, including newspapers, TV and cell phones. Before the election, the closed precinct is swept for bugging devices.

THE VOTING PROCESS

The cardinals will vote up to four times a day in a carefully scripted series of secret ballots. If no one is elected in the first three days, the cardinals will pause for a day of prayer and then hold another seven votes, followed by another day of prayer. One of the most significant changes introduced by the 1996 constitution is that if no one has been elected by a two-thirds majority after about the first 12 days, the cardinals may vote to elect the pope by a simple majority. This is intended to prevent a repetition of some of the extremely lengthy conclaves of the past. At this stage, the rules also permit the elimination of all but the two cardinals receiving most votes.

The church teaches that the election is guided by the Holy Spirit. The Cardinals are not allowed to make pre-election agreements, but this does not preclude intense discussion about the needs of the church. Cardinals are not allowed to vote for themselves, and they are likely to be quickly eliminated if they canvass personally for support.

“HABEMUS PAPAM”

Once a candidate has been chosen, the senior cardinal present will ask him if he agrees to be pope and what name he wishes to adopt. Once he has done this he will become Christ's vicar on earth. The senior cardinal deacon, at the moment Chilean Cardinal Jorge Medina Estevez, will then step onto the central loggia of St. Peter's basilica to proclaim “*Habemus Papam*” - we have a pope - and the new pontiff will appear on the balcony to deliver his first apostolic blessing to the world.

In 2003, Pope John Paul II published his last book of poetry, *Roman Triptych: Meditations*. In these poems he speaks of the Conclave which would follow his death.

*It is here, beneath this wondrous Sistine
profusion of color
that the Cardinals assemble—
the community responsible for the legacy
of the keys of the Kingdom.*

*They come here, to this very place.
And once more Michelangelo wraps them in his vision.
“In Him we live and move and have our being.”*

Who is He?

*Behold, the creating hand of the Almighty, the Ancient
One, reaching towards Adam...*

In the beginning God created...

He, who sees all things...

*The colors of the Sistine will then speak the word of the
Lord:*

Tu es Petrus—once heard by Simon, son of John.

“To you I will give the keys of the Kingdom.”

*Those entrusted with the legacy of the keys gather here,
letting themselves be enfolded by the Sistine's colors,
by the vision left to us by Michelangelo—*

*So it was in August, and again in October,
in the memorable year of the two Conclaves,
and so it will be once more, when the time comes,
after my death.*

Michelangelo's vision must then speak to them.

*“Con-clave”: a shared concern for the legacy of the keys,
the keys of the Kingdom.*

*Lo, they see themselves in the midst of the
Beginning and the End,*

*between the Day of Creation and the Day of
Judgment...*

*It is granted man once to die, and thereafter, the
Judgment!*

Final transparency and light.

*The clarity of the events—
the clarity of consciences—*

*During the conclave Michelangelo must teach them—
Do not forget: Omnia nuda et aperta sunt ante oculos
Eius.*

You who see all, point to him!

He will point him out...
