QUALITIES OF CHURCH LIFE

(Part 3 in a series of 6:)

If Acts presents the essential character of the Church as an evangelizing community, it has much more to say about the qualities of Church life. These were exhibited throughout the readings of the Easter season and can be grouped for the sake of convenience into four categories:

- *The Church as a multicultural, universal community;*
- *The necessity of giving witness to Jesus Christ even in the midst of suffering;*
- *The Church as a community of prayer, worship and joy;*
- *The inevitable success of the gospel message through the Holy Spirit;*

Everyone Everywhere:

First, Acts reveals a Church, which is a multicultural, universal community. One should not miss the fact that on Easter Sunday the first reading taken from Acts is an excerpt of Peter's speech at the conversion of Cornelius and his household, gentiles from Caesarea (10:34-42). Peter begins by noting that "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him" (10:34-35).

One of the great hallmarks of the Catholic Church has always been its openness to this diversity.

Between Easter and Pentecost, the liturgical year recounts the conversion stories of many others of differing ethnic and cultural backgrounds. They all provide testimony to the effectiveness of God's power, at work through the apostolic preaching, in bringing people to Christ.

This theme of the universal appeal of Christ returns at the end of the Easter season, like a matching bookend. The Pentecost story is the quintessential story of universalism.

The Holy Spirit descends on the apostles and enables them to speak in tongues mirroring the nations of the known world.

In this theme, Acts points out a quality of the Church that speaks to our own day. More than ever, we live in a small world where mobility has enabled the migration of many peoples. Virtually every sector of the United States has been touched by the presence of diverse ethnic groups who have come to America seeking freedom, security and prosperity. Our towns and our churches are filled with people of diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds. It can be a challenge to incorporate them seamlessly into our faith communities.

*One of the great hallmarks of the Catholic Church has always been its openness to this diversity. Catholic (from the Greek *katholikos*) means "universal." The entire Easter season celebrates this universality. Peter's speech at Solomon's Portico, for example, expresses this stance. Peter points out how Jesus Christ fulfills God's promise to Abraham that in him "all the families of the earth shall be blessed" (3:25). Languages and accents may differ, customs and styles of dress may vary, but the Easter season testifies to the universal call of Jesus Christ.*

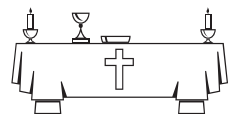

Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Sunday May 29 - Feast of the Body of Christ (Corpus Christi)

Traditionally on Thursday after Trinity Sunday, the Feast is celebrated in honor of the Body of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament and in commemoration of the institution of the Blessed Sacrament. It is held on the feastday or on the following Sunday and includes a Eucharistic procession concluded with Benediction.

Special Eucharistic Procession

After the 4:30 pm Saturday and 12 noon and 6:00 pm Sunday Masses this weekend, Holy Family will celebrate with a traditional Corpus Christi Procession. The Blessed Sacrament will be processed from the church through the parish grounds and back to the church where a Benediction will conclude the procession. All are invited to participate in this blessed event as we continue to celebrate the Year of the Eucharist!

INCENSE SCHEDULE FOR CORPUS CHRISTI:

Incense will be used at the Masses this weekend with the exception of the Noon Mass.

ARTICLE 2: A ROYAL PRIESTHOOD

[As part of our ongoing celebration of the Year of the Eucharist, Holy Family will present each week this series "Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis through the remainder of the church year.]

Most Catholics are aware that we cannot celebrate the Eucharist without a priest. While this no doubt makes priests feel needed, it can have an unfortunate side effect. Sometimes it leads us to think of the Mass as something that the priest does for the rest of the church. In fact, the Mass is something that we all do together. We need a priest to lead us, but he needs us to worship with him, too.

The first part of the Roman Missal, called the General Instruction, says that "the celebration of the Eucharist is an action of the whole Church." It goes on to say that the people who gather for Mass form "the People of God, purchased by Christ's Blood, gathered together by the Lord, nourished by his word. It is a people called to bring to God the prayers of the entire human family, a people giving thanks in Christ for the mystery of salvation by offering his Sacrifice. Finally, it is a people made one by sharing in the Communion of Christ's Body and Blood. Though holy in its origin, this people nevertheless grows continually in holiness by its conscious, active, and fruitful participation in the mystery of the Eucharist" (#5).

We've heard that term a lot in recent years, haven't we? "Full, conscious, active participation by all the people" in the Mass—that's what the Second Vatican Council in the 1960's called the "aim to be considered before all else" (CSL, # 14) in the reform and promotion of the liturgy. The council was so concerned about this because it recognized that this kind of participation "is the primary and indispensable source from which the faithful are to derive the true Christian spirit." It is by our taking part in the offering of the Mass that we are to become more and more like Christ. It is our primary path to holiness.

The council fathers insisted such participation is our right and duty by reason of our baptism, because through baptism, we have become "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people" (1 Pet. 2:9). We all share in the priesthood of Christ, and it is Christ who offers his sacrifice to the Father whenever Mass is celebrated. Thus the council said this full

participation is "called for by the very nature of the liturgy." All the baptized form Christ's body, and it is the whole Christ, head and members, who offers the sacrifice of the Mass.

Perhaps one of the most important things we might learn from this Year of the Eucharist is the importance of the assembly at Mass. Sometimes we think that our presence or our participation doesn't matter much. But each one of us is important to the celebration of the liturgy. We each have a role to play that no one else can do for us. Only together can we offer God proper worship. Let us all lift up our voices and our hearts to the Lord as we share in Christ's sacrifice.

5. In addition, the nature of the ministerial priesthood also puts into its proper light another reality, which must indeed be highly regarded, namely, the royal priesthood of the faithful, whose spiritual sacrifice is brought to completeness through the ministry of the Bishop and the priests in union with the sacrifice of Christ, the one and only Mediator. For the celebration of the Eucharist is an action of the whole Church, and in it each one should carry out solely but completely that which pertains to him or her, in virtue of the rank of each within the People of God. In this way greater consideration will also be given to some aspects of the celebration that have sometimes been accorded less attention in the course of time. For this people is the People of God, purchased by Christ's Blood, gathered together by the Lord, nourished by his word. It is a people called to bring to God the prayers of the entire human family, a people giving thanks in Christ for the mystery of salvation by offering his Sacrifice. Finally, it is a people made one by sharing in the Communion of Christ's Body and Blood. Though holy in its origin, this people nevertheless grows continually in holiness by its conscious, active, and fruitful participation in the mystery of the Eucharist
