**MORE THAN UNDERCOVER AGENTS**

(Part 4 in a series of 6:)

As we continue, the Church described in Acts understands the necessity of giving witness to Jesus Christ even in the midst of suffering.

A prominent feature of Acts is the regular presentation of stories about giving witness in word and deed to the message of Jesus Christ. The Greek work for "witness" is the same as the English word martyr. Many of the stories of Acts heard throughout the Easter season reminded us of the price our ancestors in faith paid for proclaiming the gospel message.

While Stephen's martyrdom is the prime model of witness for Acts (7:54-8:1), not all the persecutions end in death. Peter, John, Paul and others throughout Acts suffer imprisonment, beatings, trials and numerous other tribulations for the sake of testifying to their faith in Jesus Christ as the crucified and risen Savior of the world. At times, God sends them miraculous aid (e.g., Paul and Silas imprisoned in Phillipi, [16:22-34]). At other times, the resourcefulness of the apostles themselves leads to a respite in their persecution (e.g., Paul before the Sanhedrin [23:6-11]). In either case, the goal is said to be the same. The Church must give testimony in good times and in bad, in suffering and in success. In all cases, the community is to "bear witness" to Jesus.

This aspect of the Easter message may seem more difficult to apply in our day, but perhaps not. For example, the Catholic Church continues to reel from the revelations of sexual abuse of minors. Many believe the voice of the Church as a moral force in our society and in our world has been muted because of this terrible, embarrassing failure of trust. In this case, the interference with the Church's ability to give witness to the message of Jesus Christ is not external persecution but internal misdeeds. Both can mute the voice of authentic testimony. The message of Acts is to

persevere and not let this stumbling block silence our voices permanently.

**PRAYER, PRAISE AND DELIGHT**

The Church of Acts is a community of prayer, worship and joy. This may seem obvious, but we easily forget that many distractions can lure us away from the essentials of faith. Acts emphasizes that the Church is first and foremost a community of prayer, worship and joy. On the Second Sunday of Easter the second reading described in idealized terms the Church's communal life. "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (2:42). The reading goes on to describe how all the members of the community shared their property in common. "Fellowship" included sharing goods with other members of the community (see the idealized description in Acts 4:32-35). They broke bread in their homes (2:46), a New Testament expression for celebrating the Eucharist, and thus highlighting the sacramental dimension of the community. Acts also recalls the pervading attitude of joy and exultation, rooted in the resurrection of Jesus, that resounds in the life of the Church, even in times of persecution (2:47; 5:41; 13:52; 15:3). Such idealistic descriptions are reminders of the true nature of the Church community.

As a follow-up to the Easter season, this is a time to reemphasize the goal toward which every Church community should strive. But we probably should acknowledge that most of our communities fall short of this vision of being of "one heart and soul" (Acts 4:32). As many priests I know have jokingly commented, the good warmth of community seems to evaporate rather quickly in the rush to be first out of the church parking lot. Interestingly, while these readings emphasize this ideal picture of the early Church, Acts hints at times that all was not perfect.

## ARTICLE 3: WELCOMING THE LORD

*[As part of our ongoing celebration of the Year of the Eucharist, Holy Family will present each week this series "Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis through the remainder of the church year.]*

Imagine that you are coming to church next Sunday. As you come through the door, you realize that someone is right behind you and you naturally hold the door open for that person. As he comes in behind you, you suddenly realize that it is Jesus himself, looking just as you always imagined him. What do you do now? What do you say?

I suspect most of us would do whatever we could to make Jesus feel welcome in our community. Of course, it's not very likely that he will show up next Sunday, looking like a first-century Jewish rabbi. He will show up here, but he'll probably look different from our usual image of him. Christ will arrive looking like your neighbor or your friend, or perhaps like a person you've never met before. He might look like a member of your family, or he might look like a homeless person who needs a bath and a haircut.

Our faith tells us that Christ dwells in every member of his body, that we can find him in the people who gather with us here every Sunday. That's the deepest reason for us to be hospitable to one another as we assemble for the Eucharist.

So often, we hear people say that the Catholic church is not very friendly. When strangers visit a Protestant church, they are usually warmly greeted and made to feel quite welcome. Many people report a very different experience in the Catholic Church. Of course, many Catholic parishes are very large, which makes it harder to know who is a visitor and who is a member of

the parish. Maybe that just gives us even more reason to be hospitable toward everyone around us, whether stranger or friend.

Through the week, all of us who are members of the body of Christ are scattered throughout our community. On Sunday, when we come to Mass, we need to reconnect with the other members of the body. Smiling and saying hello to those who gather with us can help us to connect again. Brief conversations about family members and other concerns can express the love of Christ that binds us to one another.

This is not irreverent in church, because it is the way that we welcome the Lord into our midst. Jesus said, "Where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matt. 18:20). His presence in one another is the first way that he reveals himself to us at Mass. Reverence requires us to recognize him there and to respond to him in one another. This doesn't have to be loud and raucous, but it does have to be sincere and caring.

This gathering and reconnecting with the other members of the body is an important step in getting ready for Mass. Christ invites all of us to share in his sacrificial offering to the Father. We can only do that as members of Christ's body, so linking up with the other members of the body helps us to get ready to worship together. How will you welcome Christ the next time we gather here?
