Keep the Spirit of Vatican II Alive

Benedict XVI appealed to Catholics to keep the real spirit of the Second Vatican Council alive, as the 40th anniversary of the closing of the ecclesial event approaches.

According to the Pope, the legacy of that historic assembly is decisive for helping establish "in the world that universal fraternity that responds to the will of God on man, created in the image of God."

Vatican II, which had been convoked by Pope John XXIII, formally closed Dec. 8, 1965.

In his weekly Angelus address to crowds in St. Peter's Square on Sunday, October 3, Benedict XVI highlighted two legacies left by Vatican II which changed the life of the Church and, in part, of humanity: the importance of education and the promotion of religious freedom.

He mentioned the Vatican II declaration "Gravissimum Educationis" and recalled that the Council attributed "utmost importance" to the task of education, both for the life of each person as well as for social progress.

"Also today, in the era of global communication, the ecclesial community sees the importance of an educational system that recognizes the primacy of each person, open to truth and good," Benedict XVI said.

In keeping with those magisterial teachings, he noted: "The first and principal educators are parents, helped, according to the principle of subsidiarity, by civil society."

At the same time, the Church feels she has a "special educational responsibility," as Jesus entrusted to her "the task of proclaiming 'the way of life,'" the Holy Father said.

The Church accomplishes this mission in different ways: "in the family, in the parish, through associations, movements and groups of formation and evangelical commitment and, in a specific way, in schools, institutes of higher studies and universities," Benedict XVI explained.

The other great legacy that the Pope commented on is contained in the declaration "Nostra Aetate," which he said was dedicated to "the attitude of the ecclesial community vis-à-vis non-Christian religions."

"Based on the principle according to which 'all peoples form one community' and for which the Church has the mission 'to foster unity and charity' among peoples," the Holy Father said, "the Council 'rejects nothing of what is holy and true' in the other religions and announces to all Christ 'Way, Truth and Life' in whom people find the 'fullness of religious life.'"

In this way, Vatican II proposed some fundamental truths, such as "the special bond that unites Christians and Jews," and the "esteem for Muslims and for the followers of the other religions" and it confirmed "the spirit of fraternity that prohibits religious discrimination or persecution."

Benedict XVI encouraged Christians to re-read the conciliar documents and to pray to keep the spirit of Vatican II alive.

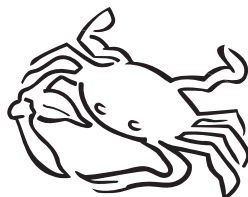

CATHOLIC CHARITIES OF CALIFORNIA ENDORSES PROP 73 – THE PARENTAL NOTIFICATION INITIATIVE

The need to promote communication within families and the foundational relationship of parent to child were cited by Catholic Charities of California as reasons for its endorsement of Proposition 73, the Parental Notification Initiative. "The well-being of families and the development of our children is dependent upon communication," says Steve Pehanich, Executive Director of the statewide association of twelve agencies. "Government policy ought to affirm and encourage the growth of parent-child relationships, recognizing that the vast majority of parents place the well-being of their children above any other consideration."

Currently all medical procedures except abortion require parental involvement, from tattoos and body piercings to receiving an aspirin or cold medicine at school.

"It is illogical for the state to acknowledge the necessity of involving parents in important decisions about their children, but exclude one procedure. An abortion has the potential of imposing a deep emotional impact and a child should not have to go through that without a parent's knowledge. An abortion can affect a person's well-being into the future," points out Pehanich.

"Children can't leave school property for a field trip without parental permission, but they can leave in an unknown person's car and undergo an abortion without permission or notification. Proposition 73 would change that practice," says Pehanich.

Fr. Michael Kiernan endorses this position saying, "We are very concerned for families and work to promote life in the family. Parental notification can only be a good thing, allowing parents to be involved in an extremely important decision in a girl's young life."

CATHOLIC CHARITIES OF CA OPPOSES PROP 76, CITING CONCERN OVER ASSISTANCE TO THE POOR

While supportive of its ultimate goal of fiscal responsibility, Catholic Charities of California is opposing Prop 76 because of the impact the initiative's automatic limits will have on services for the poor.

"All too often programs for the poor and vulnerable are the first cut," says Steve Pehanich, Executive Director. "First, because they are in the discretionary portion of the budget and second, because few people stand up for the poor in Sacramento."

Catholic Charities' concern with Prop 76 is not its goal of fiscal responsibility for our state - we fully support that - but its introduction of more autopilot functions in the budget.

"As non-profit agencies, living within our means is a daily concern so that we can continue serving our clients," explained Pehanich. "We should expect no less of every branch and every level of government."

Catholic Charities of California, however, felt that the approach embodied in Prop 76 endangers programs for the poorest and most vulnerable Californians. Placing more and more of the budget on "autopilot" threatens the programs that support the people the Catholic Charities agencies in the state serve. It also reduces the discretion and leadership of our elected officials to respond to unforeseen circumstances and changes in the economy.

"Rather than set down these automatic regulations, we encourage the Governor and the Legislature to work together to address the very real fiscal challenges faced by California," said Pehanich.

Fr. Michael Kiernan, Director of Catholic Charities for the Sacramento Diocese agrees with this position, "We have huge needs for poor people throughout the state. We need to do what we can to assist them, using our resources wisely and in a well thought out process - not by automated decisions - while trying to minimize unnecessary state expenditures and living within our means."

ARTICLE 25: EXPRESSING OUR COMMUNION

[As part of our ongoing celebration of the Year of the Eucharist, Holy Family presents each week this series "Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis" through the remainder of the church year.]

Liturgy is faith made visible. When we celebrate the liturgy, especially the Eucharist, we express what we believe in word and song and action. Sometimes when the liturgy is reformed, it requires us to relearn what the Church really teaches about its meaning.

This may be especially true of our understanding of Holy Communion. For many generations, the liturgy was celebrated without much active involvement by most of the people present. This led us to develop habits and ways of thinking about the liturgy that were very individualistic. We learned to think of Communion as a very private moment between each of us and Jesus.

The problem with that way of thinking is that it overlooks the central meaning and purpose of the Eucharist. Jesus gave us the Eucharist to make us one body in him, so Communion is never a private moment between the individual and the Lord. It is a very personal moment, but it is also communal, for it involves all those around us who share the same body and blood.

There are two primary ways that we express our unity in Christ at the moment of Communion. The first is to join in the Communion procession. As we move to the table of the Lord, we form one procession, a pilgrim people on the move together. A procession is a communal action, a group movement. It is more than just individuals going to the table. We go as one people, as one body of Christ.

The second way we express our unity at Communion, as we do throughout the Mass, is with singing.

The Communion song is supposed to begin when the priest receives Communion and continue until the last person has received. The singing accompanies the procession in which we are all involved. All of us should be singing throughout, except when we are actually receiving the bread and wine. Even when moving in the procession, we can at least sing the refrain of the song.

When the procession is finished, the singing stops and we all sit together for some time of silent prayer.

This is also a shared activity, a time to rest and pray together in the joy of our communion with Christ

and one another. Many of us are used to time for quiet prayer as soon as we have received Communion. The liturgy simply calls us to wait until all have received so that we can share this quiet time together.

When we come to the minister of the body of Christ, we bow our heads and say "Amen" to express our reverence for Christ's presence there. We do the same when we come to the minister of the blood of Christ. With our voices and our bodies, we acknowledge the Lord's presence in the bread and wine. Remembering that he is also present in all those who share the meal with us, We use our voices and our bodies to acknowledge his presence there, too. By maintaining a common posture and joining in the singing, we proclaim our faith in the presence of the Lord in all his members as we share his holy meal. It should be obvious to anyone who watches us that we reverence Christ in one another as well as in the bread and wine. Liturgy makes our faith visible.
