As coordinator of interfaith activities for the Diocese of Sacramento, I am glad to share with you how Pope Benedict reaffirmed his commitment to seek global Interreligious cooperation.

As world religious leaders met last week in Turkey for a conference seeking collaboration between the world's three major monotheistic religions, Pope Benedict reaffirmed the Church's commitment to "tirelessly" seek cooperation between peoples, cultures and faiths.

Representatives from Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity announced the second international conference, which is focusing on the theme: "Peace and Tolerance - Dialogue and Understanding in South East Europe, the Caucasus and Central Asia."

The event, which took place in Istanbul from November 7-9, was attended by his Holiness Bartholomew I, ecumenical patriarch of Constantinople, Rabbi Arthur Schneider, president of the Appeal of Conscience Foundation of New York, and was largely under the patronage of Jose Manuel Barroso, president of the European Commission.

A Vatican communiqué announced that the conference was to seek "to promote collaboration between the three great monotheistic religions - Judaism, Christianity and Islam - in order to favor reciprocal respect and mutual acceptance, and to achieve peaceful coexistence in a world that has suffered so cruelly through wars and conflicts."

Pope Benedict XVI chose Cardinal Walter Kasper, president of the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity and of the Holy See Commission for Religious Relations with Jews, as his own representative.

The Holy Father sent a message to Cardinal Kasper, expressing his best wishes to the conference participants, as well as his "appreciation for their strong commitment to fostering understanding and cooperation between the followers of different religions."

"The themes of peace and tolerance are of vital importance in a world where rigid attitudes so often give rise to misunderstanding and suffering and can even lead to deadly violence," he wrote.

"Dialogue is clearly indispensable," he continued, "if solutions are to be found to the harmful conflicts and tensions

that cause so much damage to society. Only through dialogue can there be hope that the world will become a place of peace and fraternity."

"It is the duty of every person of good will, and especially of every believer," he stressed, "to help build a peaceful society and to overcome the temptation towards aggressive and futile confrontation between different cultures and ethnic groups."

"Each of the world's peoples has a responsibility to make its own particular contribution to peace and harmony by placing its spiritual and cultural heritage and its ethical values at the service of the human family throughout the world," the pontiff said.

"This goal can only be achieved if at the heart of the economic, social and cultural development of each community is a proper respect for life and for the dignity of every human person."

He added that "a healthy society always promotes respect for the inviolable and inalienable rights of all people," before quoting the encyclical *Evangelium vitae* which says, "Without an objective moral grounding, not even democracy is capable of ensuring a stable peace."

"In this sense," the pope said, "moral relativism undermines the workings of democracy, which by itself is not enough to guarantee tolerance and respect among peoples."

Benedict went on to highlight the importance of education in truth, and of fostering "reconciliation whenever there has been injury."

"Respect for the rights of others, bearing fruit in sincere and truthful dialogue, will indicate practical steps that can be taken."

"Every person of good will," he wrote, "has a duty to work towards this goal. It is all the more urgent, however, for those who recognize in God the one who is father of all, whose mercy is freely offered to all, who judges with justice and offers to all his life-giving friendship."

Pope Benedict concluded his message by asking Cardinal Kasper to take the opportunity of the conference "to reaffirm the Catholic Church's strong commitment to work tirelessly for cooperation between peoples, cultures and religions."

To quote Pope Benedict XVI, a registered organ donor, "To donate one's organs is an act of love that is morally licit, so long as it is free and spontaneous."

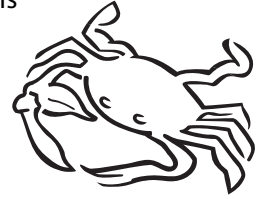

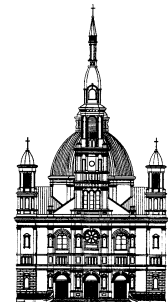

ARTICLE 26: SENT FORTH TO BE CHRIST

[As part of our ongoing celebration of the Year of the Eucharist, Holy Family presents each week this series "Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis." This is the final installment.]

When your heart beats, it draws blood into it, and then sends it to the lungs to take on oxygen. Then the blood is pulled back into the heart and finally sent back through your body to keep you alive. If the heart only took blood in and didn't send it back out, it wouldn't do you much good.

The liturgy is something like a heart. It draws us in when we have been depleted of spiritual energy. It links us to Christ, who revives our spirits and gives us strength. Then it sends us back out into the world.

This sending forth is the final section of the Eucharist. We call it the dismissal, but that's a word that can easily be misunderstood. We might think of dismissal time at school, the time we were finally free to do what we wanted. Or we might think of soldiers dismissed from formation. Dismissal can sound like simply the end of some gathering.

The dismissal from the Eucharist is more than that. The formula of dismissal in Latin is *Ite, missa est*.

That's a very difficult phrase to translate. Our current translation is, "Go, the Mass is ended," but that is a bit weak. Translated literally, the Latin means "Go, it is the sending." Perhaps a little more elegant translation into English would be "Go, you are sent." The very word we commonly use for our Sunday worship, the Mass, comes from this dismissal. The Mass is for mission; it strengthens us to send us out again.

When we are dismissed from the liturgy, we are sent forth to carry on the work of Christ in the world.

We respond: "Thanks be to God." That almost sounds as if we're just grateful it's over! What it really means is that we are grateful to God for entrusting this sacred mission to us and for strengthening us through the Eucharist to be able to carry it out.

Before the actual dismissal, we hear announcements for the week. The reason they come at this point in the liturgy is that they should be telling us ways that we can carry on our mission during the week. Here we receive the information we need for our "assignments" for the Lord. Then we pray for God's blessing before we are formally sent out on mission.

Of course, in most parishes, we actually conclude with a final song that accompanies the procession of the ministers through the assembly. That means that the liturgy is not over until the song is finished. It is really scandalous in some parishes to see many people leaving early. Some leave during Communion itself. Others leave as soon as the song begins. It's time to end this disrespectful habit. Basic courtesy and respect for the Lord and for our brothers and sisters requires all of us to stay in our places singing until the final song is concluded.

Even then, we don't have to make a mad dash for the parking lot. If we care about our brothers and sisters here, some time in conversation and fellowship after Mass is certainly appropriate. Some people may have pressing obligations that require them to leave quickly, but most of us could linger a bit with one another to share our joy in the Lord. Then we go forth to bring Christ to all those we meet throughout the week.
