A Visit to Rome

I have been invited to participate in a course in Rome designed to introduce participants to the ecumenical and interreligious movements from a Roman Catholic perspective. The course will offer a historical and theological overview of the issues that divide Christians as well as the bonds that unite them. The program will explore relations with other religious traditions. The course, which is in English, is for men and women who are in preparation for ministry or religious life, who are in the mission field, who are ecumenical officers or members of ecumenical commissions (such as myself), or who are looking for a sabbatical experience led by qualified professors and ecumenists.

The faculty includes staff members of the Centro Pro Unione in Rome and the Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute in New York. The Course is "Recognized and Endorsed" by the Graduate Theological Foundation.

The course last for three weeks. Each day, Monday through Friday, begins with Morning Prayer followed by lecture segments. In the afternoons there are on-site excursions and lectures at the Roman catacombs, the Basilica of St. Peter and excavations, St. Sabina, St. Clement, the Colosseum, "Roman ghetto," Synagogue and museum, Mosque and Islamic center and other sites.

Over the three weeks, the program will cover a great number of topics: biblical foundations; factions and divisions within the Church; the modern ecumenical movement; Vatican II and the principles of Catholic ecumenism; ecumenical documents; dialogues overview; reading of

ecumenical texts; concept of reception in the ecumenical movement; World Council of Churches; worldwide ecumenical and interreligious organizations; a visit to the Pontifical Councils for Promoting Christian Unity and for Interreligious Dialogue; Eastern Christianity; an overview of the Reformation and catholic Reform movement; exploration of the various dialogues which exist between the churches, their context and results; Jewish-Christian relations; Christian responses to people of other faiths; fundamentalism as a worldwide phenomenon; Roman Catholicism and Islam in dialogue; religions of the subcontinent of India; new religious movements; and, grassroots ecumenism. On June 29, the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul, we will participate in the Papal Mass of the Pallium.

This is also a good opportunity to experience Rome itself and learn more about our church, other Christian denominations and other world religions. I will leave on June 21 and return July 21, spending most of the time in Rome with a five-day visit to my family in Ireland at the end of the course.

I know the parish will be in good hands with Fr. Aidan O'Reilly here full time as acting pastor and another priest to help him on weekends after Fr. Santiago leaves on June 29th. I hope the priest replacing Fr. Santiago can begin his ministry no later than the week of July 24th when I return so that we start off together as a team. The announcement of Fr. Santiago's replacement may come in the next week or so at which time Bishop Weigand will also set his starting date at Holy Family.

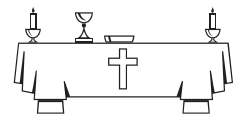

PARISH STEWARDSHIP UPDATE

With the beginning of the new fiscal year approaching, I again humbly and deeply thank you for your tremendous generosity to Holy Family Parish. Since I arrived here I have promised that your generosity would be put to use in as careful and efficient a way as possible, and I have made and will continue to make every effort to keep that promise. And, in that same time, you have never ceased to amaze me with your generosity and willingness to do what it takes to support your parish family. Fr. Santiago, Deacon Mark and I are truly grateful for this spirit and for your tremendous support.

We still have much to achieve, but we are meeting our responsibilities and preparing for our future in practical and reasonable ways. As always, I am grateful for the dedication and hard work of our excellent Finance Council. Just as a year ago, we have established an economical budget, and we are continuing to develop a sound plan to retire our parish debt and address the many improvements needed around the parish grounds. I hope you continue to review the stewardship report that appears in each Sunday's bulletin, and I hope you find it useful.

As we move into another new fiscal year, it will be critical to continue the same high achievement level we have established. While we continue to work very hard to keep expenses in line, our budgeted needs for the

coming year will be slightly higher than the last. I humbly ask that we set a new goal of \$11,000 in regular collections each Sunday, a \$500 increase over last year's weekly goal. This figure is based mainly on our needs but also on our track record – we successfully improved from the previous year to the one we are now completing, and I believe we can continue making this necessary progress. With this new level of stewardship, we can to continue to do the vital work of the Lord in our parish community.

May God continue to bless you in your generosity, and may you and your families enjoy a blessed summer, and have an abundance for every good work in the Lord.

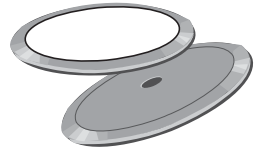

ASSISTED SUICIDE ALERT

The legalization of Assisted Suicide is unfortunately again being looked at by our State Legislators. The Bill, AB651, will go to the State Senate Judiciary Committee on June 5th.

"Euthanasia advocates the claim that assisted suicide would be restricted to a 'last resort' for people already on the verge of death and in unrelievable agony. These premises have already proven to be false. Most patients and their families are generally unaware that pain can be reduced or eliminated. Many people whose deaths have been hastened by euthanasia were not, in fact, terminally ill." (From a book review on Forced Exit by Wesley J. Smith.)

Margaret Sager of the Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals, when testifying in opposition to the legalization of assisted suicide, stated that, "the notion of personal 'choice' in assisted suicide is patently absurd when treatment and adequate pain relief are actively denied."

Assisted suicide starts us on a deadly road of controlling health care costs. This issue will NOT go before the California voters - it will be decided by our legislators. We need to speak out and go against the pro-death culture of our times.

Health Ministry

SUMMER IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER!

Now is a good time to review a few simple healthful precautions before the temperature soars:

- 1. Protect yourself from the West Nile Virus! Apply an insect repellent with DEET. In addition, if you are out in the dawn or dusk hours of the day, wear long sleeved shirts and pants (with a tight weave fabric) when working in the yard, camping or hiking, etc. Empty containers filled with standing water to avoid mosquito breeding sites. An inch of standing water is an invitation to the mosquito population to set up housekeeping. Repair window and door screens to prevent mosquitoes from invading your homes.*
- 2. Protect your skin from sunburn. Apply a sun block lotion or cream with a UV rating of 15 or higher. Read the instructions carefully. The lotion will need to be reapplied after swimming or extended periods of exposure to the sun. Wear a wide brimmed hat to protect your head, ears and neck from excessive sun exposure when participating in outdoor activities. Protect your eyes from bright sunlight with quality UV protective sunglasses. Blue eyed people are more sensitive to light and should protect their eyes from bright sunlight.*
- 3. Keep yourself hydrated. Our bodies need 6-8 glasses of water each day (unless otherwise instructed by your doctor). Summer heat increases water loss through the skin-- perspiration. Consumption of alcohol and caffeinated beverages can also cause dehydration. Combined with the summer heat and excessive physical activity, it is essential to replace the fluid. WATER is an effective and inexpensive choice.*
- 4. Swimming pool owners, check to see that your pool is secure and safe from adventurous youngsters. Check for loose fence boards, non-working gate latches, etc. Parents, swimming lessons given in toddler years can prevent years of heartbreak because of a drowning accident. Children slip into the water SO QUIETLY! Life preserver wear can be purchased for toddlers.*
- 5. Treat yourself to a mini vacation at home. Set aside some ALONE time. A few minutes or an hour each day spent enjoying the quiet beauty of nature, reading and thoughtfully meditating on a passage from the Bible or just giving thanks to the Lord for all the wonderful things He has provided for your enjoyment will refresh your body and spirit. PEACE!*

TRINITY SUNDAY

The feast of the Most Holy Trinity may well be regarded as the Church's *Te Deum* of gratitude over all the blessings of the Christmas and Easter seasons; for this mystery is a synthesis of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost.
