Looking Back — Looking Ahead

Recently the lady who was secretary at the parish where I started my priestly ministry went to her heavenly reward. She was a gentle loving servant of the parish, enriching my life and the lives of all who knew her. Her death made me think of how the church was back in those days compared to the church today.

I think it is true to say that the leaders of the Second Vatican Council were very enthusiastic, hopeful, positive, sure of their Catholic faith and wishing to reach out to the world at large. It was an exciting time of hope and promise while, perhaps in retrospect, a little naive. The Church at that time was solid. People knew the Catechism, attended Mass, went to confession, participated in many devotions, encouraged their sons and daughters to be priests and sisters, and, to a great extent, lived in a religious milieu of church language and culture.

So much has happened since then. Who could have foreseen the wars, big and small, all over the world, the rise of terrorism, the disaster of drug abuse, the culture of death happening in so many ways? Who could have foretold the challenge the church faces today? We now are in a very different situation.

Recently, I had breakfast with a wonderful sister who is my counterpart as director of a Catholic Charities agency. We were discussing the challenges we face in promoting Catholic identity such as the many uncatechized Catholics, small numbers of candidates for priesthood and religious life, low Mass attendance, to mention a few. It is clear that we have much to do to promote a strong and vibrant Catholicism.

We do not have to abandon all that is good since the Council but must look at what the needs are today and how we can build up our church in a lively faith in Jesus Christ. This has been a great theme of Pope Benedict XVI and will surely be our work for the decades to come. It will not be easy or quick.

When in Rome in July, I asked a wise priest, “will Pope Benedict be able to transform and renew Europe and the world?” He answered, “Benedict is a man of great faith and enormous intellect but a humble poor man under the enormous weight of the Papacy. He will do his best but the real transformation must be in developing the whole church.

We must restore the church so that all professions; doctors, lawyers, professors, teachers, health providers, politicians at all levels, and all other professions know the faith and share its life giving good influence in the world in which we live to produce a culture of life. The Pope will lead and inspire but it is much greater than one person and even one pope.”

I believe our great responsibility in the church today is to see Catholicism as a whole, for various factions to prayerfully examine their positions and the positions of others, to realize what we have in common, to see the opportunity we face, and to center our faith and practice on Jesus. It is unhelpful to create camps, to see Vatican II on one hand as the problem or on the other hand to present the Council as the final answer in opposition to today’s new initiatives. The Council did great things and much good has come from it. However, a long time has now passed in a very rapidly changing world.

We see how change is much more rapid in our modern world and so a forty year distance from the Council now could be the equivalent of 400 years in centuries gone by. We can use all the good that the Council proposed and inspired but now must look at who we are and how we can inspire and live the ancient faith ever old, ever new. Now in this place and time we must see how to maintain or restore Catholic identity to be faithful to Christ.

This should not be done in terms of victory for one group or another but in a general humble endeavor to know and live the truth of Christ. It will involve creativity, new processes and procedures, recovery of something left behind or forgotten. It will be like a situation in which someone says, “Here are two things abandoned by the Church after the Council,” and the leader says, “Yes, thank you. The first one you can throw away as it is no longer of use to us but the second one, thank God you found it, as we badly need that always in the Church.

It is vital that we avoid ideological polarization in the church. Benjamin Franklin said, “Disputing, contradicting, and confuting people are generally unfortunate in their affairs. They get victory sometimes, but they never get good will, which would be of more use to them.” We must engage the world and not fear it but also we cannot accept the world simply as it is. We must challenge its values, infusing into it our Catholic faith, the power of God, the salvation wrought in Christ, the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, our humble service and love for all that is holy and good, building up the earthly city as we proceed to the heavenly one. We must look at all the variety of gifts and wisdom in our Church and give these direction and life.

We face an exciting, God given, life-enriching task as committed people of our holy Catholic Church to make real the full truth of the human person, enrich the world and bring all to salvation now and in heaven.

In Christ all will find their full potential, joy, peace and service. May God inspire us in this holy endeavor.

What is the Annual Catholic Appeal?

16 years ago, The Annual Catholic Appeal began in response to the intense need to help people in our own communities. Funds from the Annual Appeal have enabled our social service organizations, year by year, to help those who struggle to overcome severe poverty of mind, body, or spirit. The Annual Catholic Appeal also provides funds to individual parishes for their own ministries to people in need.

Who will receive support from the Appeal?

At any given time, there are as many as 400,000 people in our diocese who live in poverty. Last year, tens of thousands sought help through programs supported by the Annual Catholic Appeal.

These are good, yet disadvantaged people: older people, foster teens, children, refugees, working families, immigrants, pregnant women, homeless and mentally ill- here in our neighborhoods.

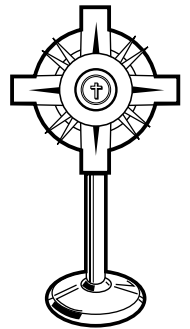
VOCATIONS CROSS
