PENTECOST - COMMUNICATING THE MESSAGE

We have just celebrated the feast of the Ascension, and now we are celebrating the feast of Pentecost. The two are connected as Jesus made it clear he had to return to the Father in order to send the Spirit. One of the things that is so exciting about this feast is that it marks the beginning of the Church. We are engaged in the same kind of work Jesus was engaged in when he walked this earth. It is clear from scripture and from everything around us that Jesus came so that we might have more life to begin a new journey — to awaken ourselves and to take the first steps into a greater fullness of life. What is so clear in the life of Jesus is that he always recognized how much the skill that he had, the power he possessed, was always somehow connected to a gift he had been given first. We sense the beginning of this great work we are to accomplish.

One of the things we can sense is that this God who became flesh was longing to communicate with us. He had the law and the prophets as instruments to communicate, but it wasn't enough. A person needed to come into the world to make it clearer, to give us a visual sense of who God is. And so, God sent His son. Jesus is the embodiment of God's longing to communicate, wanting our attention, longing to show us.

In this moment after Jesus' return to his Father, he has his followers gathered in a room. He is beginning his work called the Church. First the room begins to be filled with great energy - wind. Wind is a powerful image of Spirit. We don't know where it comes from or where it goes, but we can certainly feel its effect. Then, there were tongues of fire. It is not an accident that the Spirit is appearing as tongues - the instrument we use to speak - on fire with their need to be used, to speak, to give the message. And then, this miracle happens. There are all kinds of foreigners around who speak different languages. With the gift of the Spirit, the Galileans speak in their native language, but everyone hears them in their own native language. Something was communicated that went way beyond words, beyond the normal way people understand things. Could it be that we are being taught that the power of the Spirit that comes into us is able to communicate something using the means we normally use but in ways far beyond what we can imagine. A touch. A word. A gesture. An image. All of these things we use to communicate with one another. What if they contain so much more power than we ever realized? What if the Spirit is coming into us to help us communicate something beyond our imagining.

Today the Church is inviting us to reflect upon an event that happened in the beginning but which is continually happening now. It is the Spirit being given to human beings, enabling them to communicate something. The real challenge of the gospel is not to preach, to speak in tongues that say, "Be careful. Don't make a mistake." The marvelous actions of God are not in his laws that tell us what to do. The marvelous actions of God are found in his forgiveness, in his understanding, his love, but most especially in God's desire to share his life and his goodness with us. God invites us to embrace the goodness all around us. Paul talks in the letter to the Corinthians about giving us gifts, gifts given for the good of the community that all have meaning and purpose. Paul is saying, "Don't you see that God is giving people different kinds of gifts and the same Spirit? The reason he is giving the gifts is not to protect these individuals from sin but to invite them to share these gifts with others so the community is built up." It's about a God who wants us to sense and feel the gifts of life that are all around us. There is pain and suffering in this process. We are constantly growing and changing, and change is not always easy. But what a tragedy it would be if we missed the most exciting, extraordinary message — this message that is like a burning tongue desiring to be proclaimed by those who bear the name Christian of how good the world is. How exciting it is to be alive and how wonderful are the things around us!

How exciting it is to be used by God to bring about this kingdom. We all know that life is anything but perfect. We all know how it is to expect the perfect moment — whether it is the perfect social event, the perfect liturgy, the perfect wedding, the perfect whatever — the harder you try to do that the more clearly reality comes around - something will happen to make it not perfect. Does that mean the world is really messed up because it's not perfect? Are we intended to be perfect, or are we intended to fall from time to time. We are intended to always grow, to be in touch with this dynamic power that heals and forgives — but most of all, we are invited to engage in a work - the incredible work of bringing life to other people. We are to be used by God. God needs people. That's what Pentecost is all about: God somehow mysteriously shaking things up, making his power felt, and enabling people to give each other a message that is much, much more than just a spoken word.

The Holy Spirit is like a breath of life, that comes out of Jesus and breathes on us. Jesus says something to us like, "Receive the Spirit that is in me. What you just saw me do, I did because of this extraordinary gift of Spirit within me. I just want you to have it. Recognize that when you have it — when I breathe this Spirit on you — you are going to have the power to forgive." That's another way of saying we have the power of giving life. When we free people with that gift, we have really set them free. If we don't, if we continue in some kind of narrow, rigid view of the world where people are afraid and feel they are always going to make some kind of mistake and they'll be kept bound. Oh how Jesus longed for people to be freed! Jesus doesn't want us to be caught in a place of anxiety. He wants us truly to be free and to embrace the world as he has created it.

Questions of the Week:

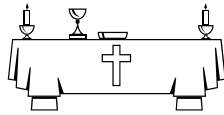

Leaving a Legacy through Planned Giving

Your love and commitment to Holy Family Parish and School can continue with a planned gift. You can make a bequest through your will that would guarantee your commitment to our students forever. Consider naming Holy Family Parish or School as a beneficiary in your estate. All bequests to Holy Family Parish or School are exempt from federal estate taxes. New Provision in the Internal Revenue Code

A new provision in the Internal Revenue Code allows people 70½ years of age or older to make tax-free direct transfers from their IRAs to Holy Family Parish and School or other charities. This is a tremendous giving opportunity. The new rule permits you to make donations directly to Holy Family Parish or School without counting them as part of your income for the year and, consequently, without paying taxes on them. In addition, charitable gifts from an IRA can satisfy the minimum annual distribution requirement. Thus, you can redirect taxable income you would otherwise be required to receive to Holy Family Parish or School.

Keep in mind that the provision is only for tax years 2006 and 2007, so please consider acting soon.
