FROM THE QUESTION BOX

Thanks to those who put a few questions in the box at the entrance of the church. My hope was that these would be questions of large interest to the Parish e.g. scripture questions, theological questions, history or help on matters like faith, prayer, practice of the faith, how to develop a strong Catholic life, things people don't understand about our Catholic faith. Please ask me or the other priests or Deacon Mark about issues that are of personal concern. I will answer general interest questions in the bulletin or at Mass once in a while. This time I deal with Church dress, special images in the Sanctuary, Homilies, Reverence, the Creed and Deacons.

CHURCH DRESS

It is clear people should try to dress nicely, modestly, and as one would for an important occasion. Of course on occasion people just make it to Mass coming from work or even the beach. This should not happen too often so in general nice, comfortable, clean, attractive dress for men and women is quite okay. It is important we can be at home and relaxed in the House of God but it is also a special place of reverence and respect so we should make an effort to both inwardly and outwardly show our respect and reverence to God and those around us.

SPECIAL IMAGES IN THE SANCTUARY

We only have present the items the church outlines for worship and no special additions are needed or allowed. There is not to be two of anything e.g. just one cross. If you seek any clarification of this please see me after the Mass sometime.

HOMILIES

Often people say they are boring. However, most priests want to meet the minds and hearts of a rainbow of people on Sunday mornings, I can assure you that any priest who exercises time and ingenuity on his homilies would welcome whatever critiques and suggestions people might offer. I, and most other priests, I believe, appreciate reactions from our parishioners. Feedback on his homilies is one of the things a priest needs most and receives least. Sometimes it is difficult to implement suggestions for one reason or another, but we're grateful for them anyway.

THE CREED

Is the Creed necessary? Sometimes when people travel they say, the Profession of Faith, neither the Apostles' nor Nicene Creed is said at Mass. Some feel they have not fulfilled the Sunday obligation as if they had not attended a complete Mass. The presence of the Creed does not determine the validity of one's participation in the Eucharist. The praying of the Profession of Faith is not an essential part of the Mass on Sunday or any other time. The official instructions for the Mass, however, provide that the creed

be recited by the priest and people at least on Sundays and special feasts. There is no liturgical basis for regularly neglecting that part of the Mass.

REVERENCE - BOW OR GENUFLECT?

Genuflection, bending one or both knees as an act of reverence, happens to be the act of reverence Catholics of our time and country are most accustomed to. But a profound and devout bow can be just as reverent. Until perhaps 300 years ago, bowing was the common way of showing reverence to the Eucharist, or to the crucifix. It was considered proper, in fact, for young girls to curtsy to the Blessed Sacrament. Our practice of genuflection derives mainly from practices of imperial Rome and later courts in Europe.

DEACONS AND HOLY ORDERS

A recent article celebrating Vatican II's restoring permanent deacons in the church states, "In its effort to update the life of the church, Vatican Council II made allowance for the diaconate 'to be restored to its own permanent position in the hierarchy' (Lumen Gentium 29), also making it possible for married men to be conferred this sacrament.

St. Hippolytus, a Roman priest who died in 236, left us a valuable work entitled *The Apostolic Tradition*, with information about Christian worship and structure in his time. The bishop is the sacerdos (priest), says Hippolytus, elected by the people and ordained by imposition of hands by another bishop. The bishop, among other functions, presided at the Eucharist and proclaimed the Word of God.

Presbyters (elders or priests) were ordained by the bishop, with other priests laying hands with him. They stood with the bishop as he presided at the Eucharistic celebration, and themselves presided at the Eucharist with the bishop's permission.

Deacons were ordained by the bishop alone, since he determined the specifics of their service to the local church.

With the restoration of the permanent diaconate in the last 40 years, the Catholic hierarchy described by Hippolytus remains in basic outline the one we know today.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, summarizing this tradition, speaks of two degrees of ministerial participation in the priesthood of Christ, the episcopacy and the presbyterate, and a third degree, the diaconate, to serve liturgical and other needs of the local community as determined by the bishop. "Catholic doctrine teaches that the degrees of priestly participation (episcopate and presbyterate) and the degree of service (diaconate) are all

MAKING CURRENT GIFTS FROM YOUR IRA

New law allows gifts to charity directly from your IRA. Recent legislation allows donors age 70 1/2 or older to make gifts to Catholic Relief Services using funds transferred directly from their IRA without paying taxes on the distribution. This manner of giving is in effect until December 31, 2007.

Features of the new law:

- A charitable transfer from an IRA generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction .
- The amount transferred is not included in your adjusted gross income. This can affect issues such as qualifying for other tax breaks.
- The gift is ideal for those who are required to take distributions, but do not need them for living expenses.
- The gift from the IRA counts toward your minimum required distribution.
- You can transfer up to \$100,000 per year directly from an IRA.
- The gift can be beneficial for those who do not itemize or who cannot make full use of their charitable contributions either because of deduction limits or their income level.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

The “official” end of the Capital Campaign was June 30th. As mentioned in last year’s financial report, the short-fall on our parish’s contributions has to be made up to the diocese from general funds. However, within the parish, contributions from those who have not completed their commitment will continue to be encouraged to reimburse the general fund. Specific results of the campaign will be included in the annual financial report.

three conferred by...the sacrament of Holy Orders" (1554 and 1596).

A letter of St. Ignatius of Antioch, martyred in Rome about the year 107, emphasizes the importance of the three degrees of Holy orders, bishops, priests and deacons, in the life of the church. "Without them," writes Ignatius, "one cannot speak of the church."

It should be noted that liturgical functions of the deacons, especially at the celebration of the Eucharist, are intended to be a climax and a symbol of the other service they render to the community outside of the liturgy. This point is made constantly by those who work in the training and supervision of the deacons by the church:

1. to function as deacon at celebration of Eucharist,
2. to function as celebrant of the sacrament of baptism (anyone may administer the sacrament of baptism in emergencies; deacons are officially appointed ministers of that sacrament by the church),
3. to take Holy Communion to the sick in their homes, hospitals and other health care facilities,
4. to serve as celebrant of Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament (this includes wearing the proper vestments, exposing the Blessed Sacrament, and giving the blessing with the sacred vessel containing the Eucharist),
5. to officiate at services for the dead and at burial rites,
6. to officiate at marriages,
7. to administer the sacramentals of the church according to the rite indicated by the church, including blessing religious articles, and the blessing of throats on the Feast of St. Blasé, and
8. to bless and distribute ashes on Ash Wednesday. (see *Moto Proprio on the Order of Deacon*, Pope Paul VI, 18 June, 1967)

The 1984 Book of Blessings indicates a number of blessings at which a deacon may preside. It adds that whenever a priest is present, it is more fitting that he preside and that the deacon assist by carrying out those functions proper to the diaconate. (n.18)

Deacons may also preach at celebrations of the Eucharist and other ceremonies.

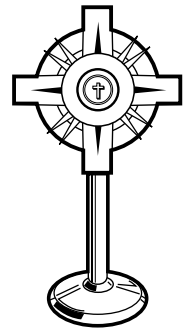


VOCATIONS CROSS
